Birdhouse Maintenance

I want to remind everybody to clean out their birdhouses. Studies have shown that adding fresh layer of wood chips in Wood Duck and Kestrel houses increase the chances of being used. It also provides a good opportunity to discard any unhatched eggs and rid the houses of any possible parasites.

If your bluebird houses are empty it's a good idea to keep them shut as any overwintering bluebirds, downy woodpeckers or chickadees might use the house for shelter in the winter. If you have mice in your bluebird house you will have to leave it open for several weeks otherwise they will move right back in again.

Deer Disease Monitoring in Iowa

The Iowa DNR actively monitors diseases affecting deer in the state. The primary diseases that are monitored include Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD), Hemorrhagic Disease/Bluetongue (HD), and Bovine Tuberculosis (TB). The pathology and disease ecology of each have vastly different consequences for deer management.

For this article I will concentrate on CWD. CWD is a neurological disease affecting primarily deer and elk. An abnormal protein, called a prion, attacks the brains of infected animals causing them to lose weight, display abnormal behavior and lose bodily functions. Signs of CWD in deer include excessive salivation, thirst and urination, loss of appetite, weight loss, listlessness and drooping ears and head. It is **always fatal** to the infected animal. Anyone seeing a deer exhibiting these symptoms should immediately contact the DNR.

Testing for the CWD protein is not a food safety test. Currently it is not believed that humans can contract CWD by eating venison; however, the Center for Disease Control and Prevention recommends, when hunting in areas with CWD, strongly consider having the deer tested for CWD before you eat the meat. If your animal tests positive for CWD, do not eat that animal.

Contact your local DNR office for testing procedures.

We cannot fight this battle alone, we need your help.

Do not use feed or salt-mineral licks to attract deer. These baited sites increase the concentration of deer, which spreads the disease.

Do not leave a carcass or bones to decay on the land. Disposal with residential waste is permissible. Contact your local waste hauler for requirements. Make absolutely sure not to transport and dump carcasses outside of the area where the deer were shot as this will spread the disease to new areas.

Dubuque and Army Corps of Engineers Sign Waterfront Plan Agreement

DUBUQUE, Iowa – The City of Dubuque and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) Mississippi Valley Division met on Thursday, Dec. 19, to formalize an agreement for assistance in the preparation of a comprehensive waterfront master plan for the city.

The agreement was signed by Dubuque Mayor Roy D. Buol and USACE Rock Island District Engineer Colonel Steven Sattinger. Following the signing ceremony, City of Dubuque staff gave USACE staff a tour of project sites along Dubuque's riverfront.

The Planning Assistance to States program was authorized in the Water Resources Development Act of 1974 and details a 50/50 cost-sharing agreement between cities and USACE to work on mutually beneficial projects. The agreement between the City of Dubuque and the USACE will focus on the development of a comprehensive waterfront plan, projected to cost a total of \$196,300. The City and USACE would each be responsible for \$98,150. The cost born by the City can be paid entirely or in part through in-kind contributions to the work of developing the plan.

The project scope is specific to Dubuque and is divided into three main tasks:

1. Identify ecosystem restoration opportunities in the Dubuque area.

- Resiliency to climate change and its effects
 - Assess storm water runoff rates over a period of time
 - Assess Mississippi River levels over a designated period of time
 - Increase pervious surface
- Increase ecosystem education and outreach within the Dubuque region
 - Create more communal sites to increase public synergy with the ecosystem

- Sustain and create native habitats in the Dubuque region
 - Greater mussel habitat development
 - Sediment traps or other best management practices to improve water quality

2. Identify recreational enhancement opportunities in the Dubuque area.

- Promote recreational development in the planning area
 - Assess Maus Lake for recreational enhancement opportunities
- Increase non-motorized boating in the water resources within the area
 - Evaluate potential kayak and canoe launch points
- Create more transitional and viewing sites
 - Create more beach/park areas and connect significant environmental sites with tour routes for the purposes of Ecotourism

3. Identify beneficial use of dredged material opportunities in the Dubuque area

- Infrastructure enhancement
 - Identify potential material stockpile sites for various future uses
